

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756–1791) was a prolific and influential Austrian composer of the Classical era, widely regarded as one of the greatest musical geniuses in history. Born in Salzburg, Mozart showed extraordinary musical talent from a very young age, composing by the age of five and performing for European royalty as a child prodigy.
